David Landsberg oversees a \$200 million operation with more than 3,000 employees and trainees, the largest employer of people with disabilities and other barriers to work in Florida. He joined the organization in 2014.

Under his leadership, Goodwill has consistently allocated 95% of its social enterprise revenues towards mission-critical services for more than 5,800 people each year.

Landsberg brings extensive business experience, having spent 30 years in the newspaper industry. "This is unlike any non-profit you have ever seen. The level and scale of Goodwill's social enterprise are much bigger than our community realizes. We need to grow and provide even greater impact."



Our History



Founded in Boston by Rev. Edgar J. Helms, Goodwill International's philosophy of giving "a hand-up, not a hand-out" was born. Partnered with the State of Florida Division of Vocational Rehabilitation Services to provide evaluation, training, and rehabilitation and placement services.



City National Bank's Leonard L. Abess and Roy A. Perry, along with James A. Ryder, launched Goodwill South Florida. John S. and James L. Knight provided their first downtown headquarters.



Received our first CARF certification (Commission on Accreditation of Rehabilitation Facilities). Since then, Goodwill has been able to maintain a three-year accreditation status from CARF.

Created the Apparel Manufacturing Division, becoming the first nonprofit in America to manufacture technically complex garments while employing people with disabilities.



Formed a Service Contract Division to employ people with disabilities in well-paid jobs, helping hundreds of individuals with disabilities secure employment.



Celebrated 65 years of transforming lives in South Florida.
